President's Corner The year in review; moving forward with new leadership

The year in review

Though not coinciding with the ski season, another program year has passed for your board of directors, and I thought it would be time for a review.

One disappointment has been our slow progress in leveraging

our 50th anniversary into publicity for the club and membership growth. Kudos to the great work on our 50th anniversary publication, but we need to be doing much more. We need additional help from members. Many projects were outlined in the May/June *Loype*. If any of these projects interest you, please email me at volunteer@north-stars.org. One exciting project we hope to undertake is an exhibit featuring Nordic skiing at the Minnesota History Center.

There is much to report on the positive side. Our weekend and day trips last summer and over the winter were enthusiastically led and well-attended, as the many Loype articles have attested. Thanks to the hard work of many North Star volunteers, the Club Express membership database and website platform have became a valuable resource for our members. The North Star Grant Fund program continues to mature. The Fund made it possible for the board to award several excellent projects, from which the club will be receiving favorable publicity. As discussed below, the club's financial accounting system has been improved. Most importantly, the Marketing Communications Plan has been thoroughly developed and is moving toward implementation. Thanks to board members, committees, teams, and independent volunteers for the past year of hard work.

New Leadership Team Members

The club's new Safety Coordinator is Maya Dahlberg. Having an extensive background in emergency health care, Maya participated in the club's recent CPR/ First Aid class. She believes all club members should know and be thinking about these matters as we lead and participate in club events. Maya wants to be sure we know both the simple things we can do to avoid mishaps for ourselves and how to keep each other safe. Look for Maya's *Loype* articles and other safety training opportunities. Our new trips coordinators are Ann Rhea and Jim Young. Call them with your outing ideas! Ann and Jim will strive to enhance and enrich our events calendar so don't be surprised if you get a call from them. Also new is Lucy Osojnicki as *Loype* editor, Jean Iwen on programs, and Rita & Gerry Manninen as programs hospitality. Barb Watts will be assisting our financial team as club bookkeeper—especially important as the club's financial matters become more complicated. On the board we welcome Ellen Watson as secretary and new at-large board members Laura Baker, Mark Lystig, and Marcy Otypka.

Club financial matters

The North Star Grant Fund program has given a tremendous boost to the club's viability but has made our financial management more complicated. To file our taxes in the past we simply needed to send in a postcard once a year. Because of the large donation, our tax filing as a 501 (c)(7) nonprofit (a tax-exempt status of social clubs) is more work. With some help from the Minnesota Council of Nonprofits, the club's tax filing for fiscal year Oct. 1, 2015 – Sept. 30, 2016, consisting of several forms, has been completed.

The board decided last year to change our fiscal year (that ran from October through the following September) to a normal calendar year. This requires doing a multi-form tax filing for the short year (October, November, and December 2016) before resuming the calendar year filing. Fortunately, after two more years the simplified postcard tax filing will again suffice.

The club's financial accounting system has been significantly improved due to the transition of our records from Quicken to QuickBooks. Quicken is a very simple system appropriate for tracking a home checkbook balance, while QuickBooks will much better track the club's income, expenses, and assets, and provide meaningful reports for the board. Thanks to Jane Laub for her hard work on this transition.

NSSTC 50th Anniversary Spring Banquet by John Driscoll

Over 150 members attended the Spring Banquet celebrating our 50th Anniversary at Keller Golf Course Clubhouse on Sunday April 23rd. Bob Smith put together an excellent slide show, and Dana Siskind made a "Fifty Shining North Star Moments" board to allow members to recount some of their favorite moments in the history of the North Star Ski Touring Club. Needless to say, she collected many more than 50 Shining North Star Moments.

Members who joined in the 1960s were recognized individually and included John Hollister, Thor Nordwall, Solveig and John Olson, Liz and Paul Rasmussen, Lucy Grams, Bob O'Hara, and Janet Gabor. All other members were recognized by the decade they joined.

The program consisted of a reflection of the NSSTC's 50 years starting from the summer meeting of 1967 when the 19 founders created a constitution and the club was born. Our club was the face of the sport of cross-country skiing in Minnesota and in the Midwest for many of the early years, and the North Stars were strong advocates for ski trails and trail funding.

Throughout the program, Inez Wick drew names for door prizes while Audry Nordwall handed them out. Many thanks to the donors who provided more than 25 door prizes at our 50th anniversary celebration: Joe's Sporting Goods; Hoigaard's; Gear West; Penn Cycle; Erik's Bike, Board, and Ski Shop; Sun & Slope Clothing Outfitters; YMCA Camp du Nord; Jim Brandenburg Gallery; Piragis Northwoods Company; Wintergreen Northern Wear; AmericInn Silver Bay; Bearskin Lodge and Resort; Pengal's Basswood Trading Company; Finnsisu.

Our club has a long legacy of service, especially in the creation and maintenance of ski trails. Over the years, we organized and ran fund raisers for multiple organizations including Camp Courage, the U of M Nordic Ski Team, and the Minnesota Youth Ski League. Separate from those activities is our history of donating funds to worthy organizations that support our silent sports mission. These include the large donations of the past year to the City of Lakes Loppet Foundation, and the Sugarbush and Norpine Trail Associations along the North Shore. Other donations include but are not limited to the following: City of Lakes Loppet, Minnesota Youth Ski League, Ski for Light, Bemidji Area Cross-Country Ski Club, Nordic Ski Patrol, National Cross-Country Ski Education Foundation, Three Rivers Park District, Minnesota Nordic Ski Association, Wirth Park, Battle Creek, Suomi Hills, Korkki Nordic, Elm Creek (40th anniversary tree planting), Algoma Highlands Conservatory (supporting Stokely Creek ski area), and the Mora Vasaloppet.

The history of our club can be found on our website. It is a tribute to all the board members, trip leaders, and volunteers over the years that we are still fulfilling our core mission, which is giving our members an opportunity to participate in silent sports through our trips and outings.

Tim Knopp Award 2017 by Cindy Koehler

This is our 15th year of choosing a club member, or members, to receive the prestigious Tim Knopp award. Tim was instrumental in trail development in the Midwest and in our club's growth from 1970 to 1990. This year's award committee consisted of Al Fox, Lois Carlson and Inez Wick. They unanimously selected a gentleman who has been an active, contributing member for nearly 40 years and has led day hikes and ski trips, and at least 150 bike rides. The award this year goes to Mel Peterson.

I will highlight a few of the positions Mel has held with North Star. They have been fact-checked and are not fake news. He served as president for two years, from 1992 to 1994. More recently he has been the assistant *Loype* editor and has just concluded another two-year term as *Loype* editor. He currently serves as the activities schedule editor as well as vice president. Mel has been the *Loype* editor for a total of 11 years, including time back in the "dark ages," before the advent of digital production of the newsletter, when he used the old-fashioned cut-and-paste method.

Some of his other volunteer positions have included serving on the nominating committee, working with the Minnesota Youth Ski League, participating in many of our fall trail-clearing weekends, and editing the first edition of "Backtracks," a review of the North Stars' first twenty years. He has also volunteered at water stops at the City of Lakes Loppet and helped staff the North Star booth at the Midwest Mountaineering Outdoor Adventure Expo.

Mel says that his favorite skiing memories are from the many weekends spent on club trips to Camp du Nord. He loves the single-track, skied-in trails of the North Arm trail system that venture onto lakes and traverse portages in the BWCAW. He has fond memories of bitterly cold evenings spent with friends in the warmth of *Torsbacke*, Thor Nordwall's cabin home in the wooded hills above Burntside Lake north of Ely. There were the infamous "death marches" with old friends Kirk Meyer, Al Porter, Ted Cardozo, Don Youngdahl and others—all-day treks on skis from Camp du Nord where if you returned to camp before dark, you somehow failed.

Mel also treasures his many visits to the high-country hut systems in Colorado. He talks about the impression the mountains had on a young, idealistic 'flatlander' who used to think that the North Shore of Lake Superior really had it all. And, like so many of us in North Star, he laments the loss of old-fashioned winters that we took for

granted during our nascent days on skis. Our club has always been largely shaped by the length and quality of our ski seasons, Mel notes, and it is difficult to watch us change along with the weather.

As we have evolved over the decades into an all-season club, Mel has been one of our most active and recognized bike ride leaders. He most enjoys leading rides in Washington County and his beloved western Wisconsin. He loves quiet country roads and river valleys, and he understands that the most scenic terrain is often the hilliest. He likes to say that the rewards are usually worth the effort. He invites you to join him this summer on rides that are getting shorter and less hilly as he ages. He protests that his reputation as a bicyclist is undeserved and greatly exaggerated. He's just a regular guy who enjoys sharing the open road with friends and kindred spirits. Mel is known for his social skills, and he can be a man of mischief. Just ask some of the women in our club. A "Ladies Only Bike Ride" was announced in the July/ August 2006 *Loype*. It promised single women the opportunity to "celebrate the feminine spirit and the camaraderie that only a gathering of like-minded women can comprehend." After declaring that this ride would be a "celebration of female solidarity," Mel announced that he was the ride leader. As one woman later scoffed, "What *chutzpah*!"

Mel went on to assure the women that he was a nice guy whose "levels of testosterone and estrogen were in perfect balance." Claiming to have spent the better part of his life trying to understand the hearts and minds of women, he saw this little event as "one more step down his path of enlightenment." And, he concluded, "All he ever wanted was to be in harmony with the gentler sex." This ride was the talk of the summer, and Mel received equal amounts of praise and scorn for his audacity. As for the ride itself, Mel would only say that it failed to live up to its billing. He got nowhere near the 20-30 women he expected. To this day he doesn't understand why.

There can be nobody more deserving than Mel to receive the Tim Knopp Award. Here is what he had to say in his brief acceptance speech at the spring banquet: "Since joining North Star in 1977, this has always been my club. I've tried other clubs but something was always missing. Much of who I am and what I've done is tied directly to North Star. Most of my recreational outings, my travels, my social activities, the friends who I care most deeply about and can trust to be there in time of need—these can all be traced back to this great club. How could I have known this when I joined, three years out of college, after hearing a blurb about the club on the radio? It's been a great ride and I am one lucky man."

My canoe trip with Terry Quam by Jim Ruhl

About ten years ago I was part of the North Star Memorial Day weekend trip to Garmisch Lodge in northwest Wisconsin. We had a great weekend of canoeing a relatively easy stretch of the Namekagon River below Cable, and as an added bonus we enjoyed ideal early summer weather. On Monday morning of that weekend everyone was having a late breakfast before packing up to return to the Twin Cities. Terry had plans to canoe a nearby 10-mile stretch of the Namekagon River that afternoon, but his canoeing partner for some reason was not available. So Terry asked me if I wanted to be his canoeing partner. I accepted the invitation without knowing what a beautiful stretch of the Namekagon River I was about to experience. We put our canoes in the river at a small dam near the lodge and took them out along a county road near Cable. Sam Meddaugh and several other canoeists joined us. The canoeing for me that day was as good as it gets-every stretch and turn of the river brought with it another scene of Northwoods beauty. Most of the section of river that we canoed consisted of class one and two rapids, with possibly a few instances of class three. I was in the front of the canoe dutifully following Terry's instructions to pull right and left as needed. I was proud of myself for keeping the canoe upright until near the end of our route. But all of a sudden my paddling skills went awry as we attempted to navigate some riffles with a log just below the water surface. I do not remember that particular stretch as particularly treacherous, but nevertheless the front of the canoe got hung up on

the log, and before I knew it both Terry and I were wrong side up and wet. The water was cool but not cold, and fortunately our clothes dried out quickly (and yes, all of our gear including cameras was secured in waterproof bags). For many years after that unplanned dunk in the river, Terry and I enjoyed a laugh or two about my miscue. Thanks to you Terry for a great memory.

Wednesday Wanderer Words Vignettes from vintage bike rides

Surprise breakfast rides. For years I led rides that met at 6:45 a.m. at the Marriott Inn in St. Louis Park. This was usually a 30-mile ride where after 20 miles we would stop for breakfast at a surprise location. As we rode, I got a kick out of overhearing conversations of the riders trying to guess where we were

going. Most times I would intentionally start out by heading off in the opposite direction of the restaurant's location. Marv Gilman was usually the one who led these "guess" discussions about where we were going with input from Graham and Germaine. Our favorite breakfast places were the Original Pancake House in Wayzata, Eggies in Crystal, and the Countryside Cafe in Medina.

Annual ride around Mille Lacs. This beautiful loop ride covered 68 miles and remained on quiet roads beside the lake for a good portion of the ride. However, one year a local took umbrage at our being on his roads and blasted his horn at each one of us as we rode singlefile along the edge of the road. One year, after getting back to our starting location, we saw Bill Lyon continue on out of the parking lot. Where was he going? We found out a little later that Bill had just turned 70 so he wanted to get in 70 miles.

Annual ride around Lake Pepin. A wonderful 70-mile ride that utilized WI Highway 35 going south and MN 61 heading north. Wind always seemed to be a factor on this ride. As we headed south, a headwind was accepted because this meant there would be a tailwind on the way back. Wrong! It just never seemed to work that way. One time, while riding with Ray Petersen, we looked toward the river and saw two flags, within a quarter mile of each other, actually pointing toward each other. No wonder we could never figure out which way the wind would be blowing on the way back to Red Wing. So much for logic.

Annual Root River excursion. I believe this "Idle Rich" event, which became a Wednesday Wanderers event, was first put together by Jinny McWethy. In those days we spent the night in the Old Barn Resort hostel just west of Lanesboro, where we slept in two, large, barebone rooms outfitted with huge, clunky bunkbeds. One year Bill Handsaker offered to lead the bikers to Lanesboro from the hostel, but when he got to the Root River Trail he went the wrong way. It was then and there that Jinny decided that Bill qualified to be the following year's trip organizer. Eventually, Ella Mogilevsky became the leader for this event and upgraded it so that we stayed in the Country Inn in Preston instead. There she enlisted Tom Gabor to perform entertaining scientific experiments and had Al Mayer lead the North Stars in singing a rousing version of the German Schnitzelbank song following dinner at the Branding Iron.

Annual Chicken-in-a-Hubcap ride. This challenging, hilly ride was a favorite for many years. It started in Hudson, headed north until it crossed the Apple River, then headed west before swinging south and re-crossing the Apple River where a daunting climb out of the Apple River Valley was a challenge. This was one of Jim Johnson's favorite rides because it took us past Standing Cedars, his favorite place to hike in Wisconsin. The ride got its name from the fried chicken dinner served in wax paper lined hubcaps at Dick's Bar in Hudson. As North Stars became more health conscious, this type of meal fell out of favor; but the ride name remained.

Annual Red Cedar Trail ride. For many years Ed Waldera led this day trip in Menomonie, Wisconsin. But as the group aged, this seemed like a long way to drive for a one-day ride, so it was changed into an overnighter. This became really appealing when the owner of the Farm House Hostel in Downsville set no limit as to how many could spend the night there. Thus, spending a night in a sleeping bag on the floor became the norm for North Stars. One hot, sultry day as we reached the south end of the Red Cedar Trail, Stu Lorberbaum asked if anyone would like a cold drink. Within minutes he offered everyone a cold refreshing drink produced from the incredibly heavy backpack he always had strapped to his back while riding.

Annual Whine and Cheese ride. This ride started in Chaska. Halfway through the ride bicyclists would take a break and rest in the shade beneath the statue of the Bongards' Dairy Cow. While there, it was customary to nibble on cheese purchased at the dairy store and whine about the hills. One year, shortly after an operation, I

had Charlie and Diane Jacobson lead the ride for me. But this time when they came to rest under the cow, my wife Jeanne and I were waiting for them, making it the only year we actually had wine and cheese on the ride.

Annual Stiftungsfest ride to Norwood Young America. It took a long time for it to pay off, but 25–30 years ago I invited a young, unmarried couple to join the North Stars on this ride. It was the young woman's first long bike ride, and needless to say she became quite uncomfortable during the ride. I thought it would be the end of their relationship, but she toughed it out and married the guy anyway. We've been friends ever since, and now that Brad

By the end of the 1980s, though, the water tribe's interest in canoeing had started to decline, to be replaced by sea kayaking on Lake Superior and elsewhere.





I have many fond memories of those trips including Gerry Manninen's tug-of-war with an otter over a fish on Fourtown Lake (I was away on a day trip, but I heard about it when I returned); a rainy trip on the Upper Iowa River in which I was forced to cancel the second day of paddling because of a two-foot rise in the river; Ann Morrissey on the same trip teaching the bartender at the Bluffton campground bar how to make a Manhattan; Dennis and Roseanne meeting our group on Polly Lake with fresh caramel rolls on the first day of their own trip; Chip Treen making French toast on Fraser Lake during a drizzle; getting lost one night on the way back to the tents from the "throne" on Winchell Lake, only to be guided back by the stars; seeing moose on several trips; watching a chipmunk try to drag off a large pancake and a gray jay trying to fly off with a pita; fog and mirror-like water on still mornings; blue skies and puffy clouds and rainbows; and of course loons and more loons.



Portraits of the Past and Present by Lucy Osojnicki

First of all, you should know that our 50th anniversary publication is not a "Special Edition *Loype*." We should probably start calling it by the title given it by Dana Siskind and yours truly: "Portraits of the Past and Present: 50 Years with the North Star Ski Touring Club."

By now you've probably had a chance to look over the publication and are wondering how we decided on the content. Well, it's a long story. It all started in late April 2016 with an e-mail from Dana, asking if I would be interested in helping put together a publication chronicling the 50-year history of the North Star Ski Touring Club. I jumped at the chance.

Over the summer, Dana and I began talking with longtime club members to find out what was important to them. At the same time, we were busy going through old *Loypes* and other material that Pat Lawrence, our club historian, provided. The North Star history had been recorded only up to 1997. We knew we needed to bring it up to date, so Dana took the years 1997–2007, and I took the years 2007–2017. It was a big job, as you can well imagine.

Then in early fall, Dana hosted a meeting at her house to gather more information from longtime club members (and some newer members too). We came up with a list of historical events that stood out, including the VJC (the first citizen Nordic ski race in Minnesota), the history of North Star ski lessons, the first "hut-to-hut" ski trip in Minnesota, the history of our club's work with government to create ski trails in the state, North Star trail clearing history, Wednesday Wanderers history, longtime North Star ski trips, and the Colorado hut-to-hut ski trips. Dana and I asked members who were familiar with these events to write articles for the publication. We also found articles in old *Loypes* that were helpful.

We could've stopped there, but we thought it was important to hear from members about their experiences with the club. So I developed a questionnaire designed to get the creative juices flowing. We also put a notice in the *Loype* and the e-loype, asking for stories and photos. Due to the phenomenal response, we decided to move the deadline from October 31 to December 31. We had not realized what a talented group of writers we have in the club. We also received hundreds of photos, not all of which found a place in the publication. As I put the publication together, I chose one or two photos that went with the stories. The rest will be kept for future use.

Once the publication was complete, we realized that all of

the articles were about skiing, which makes sense since we are a ski club after all. We were missing articles on summer events, children and family events, and singles events. The solution was easy, however, since I was taking over as *Loype* editor starting with the July/August issue. We decided to dedicate each of the three remaining 2017 issues to the missing pieces. This issue (July-August 2017) contains stories on summer events through the years; the September/October issue will contain stories on children and family events through the years; and the November/ December issue will contain stories on singles events through the years.

Dana and I had also hoped to profile 50 active members for our 50th anniversary. The list quickly grew to 70 members, but we had room to print only four (mainly the club founders) in the publication. Look for more member profiles in upcoming *Loypes*. I hope to print them all eventually. Thanks to Ellen Watson and Gerry & Rita Manninen for writing some of those profiles.

If you did not submit an article for the 50th anniversary publication, now is your chance. We welcome any and all stories and photos about North Star events. You can be sure they will find a place in upcoming *Loypes*.

Many thanks to our assistants—Anne McKinsey who proofed and edited articles that were submitted, and Margie Schally and Ellen Watson who proofread the publication after it was put together. It should be noted here that Anne is a great multitasker. She managed to proof and edit in between her many trips to the North Shore and even while attending a judge's conference at the MOA. Member Profiles

Our original goal of publishing 50 member profiles in "Portraits of the Past and Present" could not be met due to space considerations. Therefore, we will continue with profiles of members who have given much of their time to our club over the years. We begin with members who joined in the 1960s and will continue to publish profiles in subsequent *Loypes*.

John Holmquist

John Holmquist joined the North Star Ski Touring Club in

1968 and served in several capacities over the years, including president, treasurer, past president, trips coordinator, government liaison, *Loype* editor, and special projects chair.

As special projects chair in 1991–1992, John organized Ernie's Run, fielded three work crews to clean up our designated stretch of 35W for the Adopt-a-Highway program, and coordinated club participation in the La

La Palooza Loppet. The North Stars provided the bulk of the on-snow volunteers for that event. Finally, he was in charge of the North Star's annual spring banquet at the Sheraton Midway Hotel.

As *Loype* editor, John brought us into the digital age, being the first editor to use desktop publishing to produce the *Loype*. He was an excellent writer, and we were lucky to have him as a regular contributor to our newsletter even after his term as editor was through.

John skied the first VJC and the first American Birkebeiner. The Birkebeiner Foundation designated John a "Founder" for skiing the first 10 races. He completed 24 in all. In 2000, John was one of 10 North Star members to receive a plaque denoting charter membership in the Birch Leggings Society (having completed twenty American Birkebeiners)

In 2005–2006, John was appointed to a committee to look into and make revisions to our club's constitution and bylaws. His input was invaluable, no matter the time, place, or circumstance in which he was asked to provide it.

John also enjoyed bicycling and hiking, and led many such events for our club. He died in November of 2016, leaving a void. We miss his wit, his intelligence, and his insights.

John and Leslie Hollister

Our records indicate that John and Leslie Hollister



joined the North Star Ski Touring Club in 1967, but Leslie has a different account:

"Although I was born somewhat earlier, I consider my significant personal history to have begun in January 1969. At that time I underwent a metamorphosis that affected not only my style of living but my whole personality. It all began when my husband, an inveterate reader of

instructional literature, returned from the public library with a copy of John Caldwell's *The Cross Country Ski Book.* That was in December 1968. By January we were completely outfitted, and from the time I took my first tentative stride into Kenwood Park I began to be transformed into a winter person—no small change for one who was brought up amid the magnolias of Georgia. I now judge and select all activities by how well they keep me in shape for skiing."

Whatever the join date, John and Leslie were active North Star members for many years. John was appointed chairman of the first VJC in 1971. He served as club president in 1972–73 and secretary in 1975–76. He was featured in a Star Tribune article along with Bob O'Hara in December 1975. Leslie served as trips coordinator in 1973–74, president in 1979–80, and past president in 1980–81. John and Leslie led the 1974 western trip to Hideaway Park in Colorado. In 1983, they led the western trip to Black Cat Ranch near Jasper National Park in Alberta, Canada.

In 1993, John Hollister won the men's wood ski division in the North Star Classic. By the photo taken of him at our 50th anniversary spring banquet, it appears that he could still win ski races.

Lucy Grams

Lucy Grams joined the North Star Ski Touring Club in



1968 after reading an article about our club in the Star Tribune. Her three oldest were teenagers at the time, her son John was 7, and her youngest child Paul was a baby. Lucy, husband Jack, and the three girls purchased their skis, boots, and poles from Norm Oakvik, the only seller of cross-country ski

equipment at the time. They all skied the first VJC in

1971, starting at Lake Bavaria in Victoria. Her daughter Nancy still has her certificate from the first VJC. Everyone wore knickers and knee-high socks back then. Lucy's husband Jack could not ski the VJC in 1974 due to failing health. So our very thoughtful Mother North Star (Jinny McWethy) went over to the Grams' household and presented him with a VJC pin. When Jack died later that year, Lucy found solace in the friendships she had developed as a member of our club.

Lucy served as trips coordinator and led ski trips—Camp Northland / Camp du Nord for many years and later Menogyn. She remembers that accommodations were very basic back then. The second floor at Camp Northland was one big room, and there was no indoor plumbing. Nothing like a trek to the biffy on a cold winter's night! But a ski across the lake with the Northern Lights in full display made it well worthwhile. One could not count on beautifully groomed trails either—bushwhacking on back country skis was more common. Lucy treated her trip participants well, with a four-course turkey dinner ready for them when they returned from skiing.

Years ago, Kodak sponsored a "Medals for Miles" program and our club won every year. Lucy skied one of the area parks every morning to earn miles. No wonder our club won!

Lucy has fond memories of the many trips she took with the North Stars—like the 1980 Poland ski trip led by Bob Tokar and the Mississippi River bicycling trips led by Al Mayer in the mid-1990s. Al's group started from Prescott, Wisconsin, and bicycled a 400–500 mile section in each of three years to finally reach New Orleans.

Solveig and John Olson

Solveig (Jörstad) Olson moved to the United States from

Norway in May 1965 to work and travel for a year. She met her husband John in LaGrange, Illinois in September 1965 and the two were married in Norway in April 1967. They moved to Minneapolis in 1968.

In the fall of 1968,

Solveig and John noticed an announcement of an NSSTC meeting. They met Jinny McWethy and Norm Oakvik at that meeting where they discovered that the only place one could purchase cross-country skis at the time was Norm's living room. Solveig had not brought her cross-country skis with her from Norway, so she and John purchased skis from Norm as Christmas gifts for each other that year.

Solveig and John have two boys—Eric and Art. They took the boys with on NSSTC ski outings from the time they were able to sit in a back carrier. Solveig remembers Eric skiing one of the VJC races where his ambition was to "beat" Jinny McWethy. As citizen races became more popular, they signed up for one almost every weekend.

Solveig served as club treasurer in the early 1990s, and she started leading hiking and skiing trips to Norway about the same time. She has led 27 trips in all—five summer trips and 22 winter trips. The first trip was a challenging hiking trip in the Jotunheimen Mountains in 1992. That experience encouraged Solveig to lead other trips. She and John organized the next trip to the Lillehammer Winter Olympics in 1994. Eventually, they started organizing trips to Worldloppet races around the world. Anyone who has been on one of Solveig's trips knows how well organized and enjoyable they are.

An avid skier, Solveig is a charter member of the Birch Leggings Society. To be a member, one must have skied 20 American Birkebeiners. Solveig has completed 25 in all and a couple of Korteloppets. She has also completed one Norwegian Birkebeiner (in 1981). The weight of the pack was 7 kg back then but has since been reduced to 3.5 kg. And if that wasn't enough, Solveig has also completed 19 Wordloppets plus three duplicates.

Paul and Liz Rasmussen

In the early 1960s Liz (Lyons) Rasmussen came to the



United States from England to work as an au pair for a White Bear Lake family. She had joined AYH in England because of her love of hiking and biking. Through the Minnesota chapter of AYH, she met many

became members of the North Star Ski Touring Club.

After her year working as an au pair, she attended Golden Valley Lutheran College for two years. It was there that she met her future husband Paul Rasmussen who happened to be visiting the college one day. Talk about "love at first sight."

In the fall of 1968, she and her husband Paul visited a display booth for the NSSTC. Liz had never skied before, but Jinny McWethy told her "If you can walk, you can ski." She and Paul joined and became very active in this new club. In fact, Liz typed up the trip list for that winter—26 events from December seventh through April sixth, including the first weeklong western trip to the Bighorn Mountains in Wyoming.

Liz and Paul have gone on many ski trips with the North Stars—weeklong trips out west, weekend trips closer to home, and day ski outings when not working. When their children were small, they took them with on camping, canoeing, fishing, and hiking trips. On one hiking trip in the Canadian Rockies they spotted a grizzly bear up ahead and calmly turned around and told the children they had made a wrong turn.

Liz served on the board in 1970–71 as secretary. Both Liz and Paul have been important behind the scenes for the North Stars. Liz was in charge of *Loype* mailing in the 1990s, and both Liz and Paul continue to assist Dana Siskind with *Loype* mailing.

Paul served as tools supervisor for the club, making sure the tools were in working order and that the trail clearing leaders got them when needed. Liz has helped with hospitality, serving refreshments at meetings, and both have volunteered at the Midwest Mountaineering Expo booth. They are true ambassadors for the club—friendly, outgoing, and helpful.

Bob credits Norm Oakvik with getting him started in coaching. He began his coaching career at Armstrong High School in 1972, then moved on to coaching both boys and girls teams at several area high schools, including Benilde-St.Margaret's. He was elected to the High School Nordic Coaches Hall of Fame in 1996 and continues to manage multiple Conference, Section, and State Nordic ski meets.

Bob has skied 12 American Birkebeiners, three Finlandias (100K race), and numerous other races, including the first VJC.

In his many years with the club, Bob has worn several hats. He has served as programs chairperson (1981–83, 1986–88, 2003–2004, and 2015–2016), safety education chair (2004–2006), ski instructor, and event organizer (Timex/Rodale Ski Festival, Hennepin Parks "Easy Ski" program, and many other events).

Bob led the annual Giant's Ridge ski trip for over 30 years, usually held in March of each year. Many North Star members have benefitted from his ski lessons over the years, as well as his waxing tips.

Bob's summers are spent in the north woods of Minnesota and Canada. He canoes the BWCAW every year, and was elected to the Explorers Club of New York for his Arctic adventures, including the first descents of the Arrowsmith and Quoich Rivers in Nunavut, Canada.

He led a club trip to Camp du Nord in 1975 where skiers slept on the floor of Thor's Lodge. In March of 1981 he led the first "hut-to-hut" ski trip through the BWCAW. Thor began writing his regular column for the *Loype*, "Letters from the North Country," that same year.

Audry (Delano) Nordwall joined the club in the early 1980s and has led (or co-led) many weeklong ski trips for the North Stars—Sweden, Switzerland, Austria, and British Columbia. She got better acquainted with Thor on the Sweden trip which led to courtship and marriage. Audry also leads weekend and midweek ski trips in Minnesota, has cleared many trails, and has assisted in building trail shelters

Thor and Audry have hosted many North Star events at their cabin "Torsbacke" near Ely. They offer cold beverages after trail clearing and welcome everyone with a drink of Glogg at New Year's Eve.

Thor and Audry organized the tree planting at Elm Creek in 2007 to commemorate our 40th anniversary. Our club donated the funds to purchase the trees, and our members planted 630 trees in four hours!!

Thor and Audry are exemplary in their hospitality and their commitment to the club.

Wayne chronicled the first 15 years of the club in a booklet entitled "Backtracks: A North Star Retrospective."

Both Wayne and Jacque skied the first American Birkebeiner in 1973 (the long race), with Jacque being the first woman to do so. They were both designated "Founders" by the American Birkebeiner Foundation, meaning they skied all of the first 10 American Birkebeiners. In 2000, they were among 10 North Star members to receive a plaque denoting charter membership in the Birch Leggings Society, having completed 20 American Birkebeiners.

Jacque and Wayne also enjoyed bicycling, kayaking, and the great outdoors. Jacque was an exceptional bicyclist who completed some incredible long distance bicycle rides.

Surprisingly, they did all this while raising three boys, all of whom became excellent athletes in their own right. Their oldest, Allen, skied (and finished) the first VJC at the age of five. The boys went on to compete and letter in cross-country skiing in high school and beyond. What an amazing North Star family!

Wayne and Jacque built their dream home in northern Wisconsin and retired there. Sadly, Wayne died of cancer in 2002. Jacque still lives there and remains active.

Remember when looking back at trips and events from the past By Dana Siskind and Inez Wick

A perusing of old *Loypes* brings to life some of these events from the recent (and not-so-recent) past:

Remember when there was no *Loype* from April to October? The "year" ended with the April banquet and started up again in October with trail clearing (and maybe a bike ride or two). We were encouraged to bike with AYH or canoe with the Minnesota Canoe Association. The summer picnic was something to look forward to on the second Tuesday of August. In September 1986, a preseason issue of the *Loype* came out with information about trail clearings and a reminder to renew your membership for the next year. If you were not on the mailing list for the November issue, you might miss the chance to sign up for ski trips.

The 1998 summer schedule listed over 60 bike rides, over 30 hikes, and more than 10 boating events (canoeing, kayaking, sailing, rafting (Colorado), or windsurfing).

Remember the annual White Bear Lake Swim/Sail/Bike picnic and play day led by Carl Conney, Carl Bubiltz, and Carolyn Rusch? It was usually held on a Sunday and included biking, sailing, kayaking, and swimming, followed by a potluck picnic at about 4:30. Everyone was asked to bring something to grill and something to share.

Remember the Singles trip to Garmisch when they got lost after dark on the pontoon boat cruise of Lake Namekogan? As it was described in the September 2001 *Loype:* "We had planned to return before sundown, but some of our members required a potty stop ashore, and by the time we were underway again it was pretty dark. Everyone thought that the boat captain knew where in blazes he was, but alas and alack, we were decidedly lost and there was no way we were ever going to make it back alive, at least not that night.

Wandering about the very large, multi-armed lake and running low on fuel, we began searching for an island to tie up for the night. We weren't in any real danger, but it made for a good story. Finally, a boat hoist was heard off in the distance, so we approached a large dock looming out of the gloom. Our only seagoing unnamed member called in his best seagoing manner to the fellow getting his big boat into the black waters and explained that we were not lost but just needed directions back to Garmisch. He tried to give us directions, but realizing that we were a hopeless case, he guided us at three miles per hour for nearly two hours back to the Garmisch marina."

Thirty years ago the Twin Cities Metro area was experiencing record breaking heat. North Stars were no doubt dreaming of skiing through a peaceful, white landscape. But on the 23rd and 24th of July that year, a storm came through, dropping as much as 11 inches of rain over an eight-hour period in some areas. Flash flood warnings were posted as thousands of homes and businesses were flooded, cars were stranded, roads washed out, and storm sewers ruptured.

I had organized a whitewater rafting trip on the St. Louis River in Carlton for the weekend of July 25-26, 1987. What I had not anticipated was the superstorm just preceding those days.

I don't know how we made it out of the Twin Cities that day, but somehow we did. Every one of the 27 trip participants made it up to Carlton. We drove up on Saturday the 25th, camped at a group campsite at Jay Cooke State Park overnight, and ran the river the morning of July 26th. "Ran the river" is a good analogy as the St. Louis River went from 200 CFS to 12,000 CFS overnight. It was down to "only" 8,000 CFS when we put in.

Yes, the water was fast and the waves were incredible. Our guides, in kayaks, warned us about one ledge in particular-a six-foot drop known as "Electric Ledge." "Although it's no problem for the kayakers in the group, you definitely don't want to go over that ledge in a raft. So remember to paddle over to the left where the rocks are broken down making a nice chute to shoot down." Most

of the rafters managed to follow the instructions. But for the rafters who did not, it was one disaster after another. One raft flipped over on top of its occupants (who had previously been thrown from same). Although a couple of rafters gashed their feet on the rocks, there were, fortunately, no broken bones. Terry Quam, accompanying us in his kayak, took photos of the event.

One of our guides told us afterward that she had guided whitewater rafting trips in Colorado for five years and had never experienced anything that scary. Many North Stars took up sea kayaking after that adventure.
