This caused extremely icy conditions and made it difficult for beginning skiers to practice and take lessons. Hopefully there is enough base that the groomers can help the trails a bit.


# Stokely for the hardy by Ann Morrissey

At 11:35 a.m. on Thursday, January 4, seven bold and hardy North Stars, led by intrepid leaders Lee Wenzel and Carolyn Krampe, boarded a Greyhound bus for Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan via Duluth, Ironwood, and Escanaba. Following a tour of the fascinating railroad museum in Duluth (Lincoln's funeral train, the gigantic Mallet No. 227, and the William Crooks—first steam engine in Minnesota), a delightful Indian dinner, and an all-night ride, we disembarked in the "Soo" around 7 a.m.-just in time to see our shuttle to Ontario pull out of the station. An hour wait, two more shuttles, and we arrived to a warm welcome at Stokely where breakfast had been held and kept hot for us. With the thermometer at 35 below Fahrenheit, all but Cindy and Larry elected to wait until after another hearty meal (lunch) to head out to ski. And what a ski! The snow was six feet deep, the trails magnificently groomed, and we hit them running. During the day, the rest of our group dribbled in by car or plane-Lois Carlson, Sharon Grose, Gerry and Rita Manninen, and Cecily Harris. With John Symchych, Greg Kelley and Linda Grieme, and Bruce and I, we made a tight-knit and fun group of 14.

Stokely was at its best. With green the wax of the day for several days, we covered all the trails—the bravest even did the Suomi trail! Bas' Bypass, Hakon Lien, and Belleau Lake were fast and awesome, and McGuffin, with its snow -laden trees, was a winter wonderland; people skied it over and over. After six days of "around zero" skiing, we watched in amazement as the thermometer climbed steadily overnight to 40 the next day, accompanied by a steady rain. Lacking rain gear (who brings Gore-tex to Stokely?), most of us (Lee had a wet but beautiful 4.5 hour ski out to Pickard Lake) enjoyed a lazy day of reading, conversation, ping pong, and eating. On the eighth day, we again watched in amazement as the temps dropped steadily overnight to below zero. Were the trails frozen solid? Yup! Were they skiable? Yup! 

education chair. She also served on the constitution revision committee.



### **David Miller**

David Miller recalls his initial introduction to cross-

country skiing coming from friends in Northern Indiana. Not your typical locale, but for David it was his college pals at Purdue who triggered his interest. His first skis, a pair of Rossignol Caribou backcountry skis, provided the "excuse" and means to ski between cut corn stalks on a two-inch snow base. In

1979, arriving in Minnesota and still intrigued with skiing, he was advised to get better skis, which he promptly did. FinnSisu became and still is the magnet for David's recreation funds. In 1994-95, he took a Master's ski course on technique and conditioning where, unlike most of his cohorts, he spent the bulk of the time unlearning bad habits, eventually curing the bad and perfecting the good. Fortunately, skate technique was mastered on his initial training and remains his preferred technique in warmer temperatures, whereas classic dominates on the colder, harder snow. Throughout the decade 1996–2006, he enjoyed participating in the Worldloppet marathons.

During his learning curve to master ski technique and become a proficient skier, David found time to serve the club as vice president and later as president. He is also fondly remembered for leading fun-filled trips to Vermont, New Hampshire, and Quebec. Closer to home, he favors the North Shore for the long downhills and beautiful scenery of the northern Minnesota terrain.

### Al Volkers

Al Volkers joined the North Stars in 1991 after relocating



from Alabama. He was an avid cyclist, avid enough to be participating in the TRAM when Jane Batcheller suggested our club as a means to maintain fitness through the Minnesota winter. He liked the idea, took lessons locally, and signed up for a few weekend trips to develop his new-found sport. Starting with no -wax skis, he found them beneficial

for climbing hills, but they also created drag going downhill, which for a novice skier is a good thing!

Al is perhaps best known as the guy on the ground searching out scenic and spectacular locations for a series of five very popular European ski trips between 2005 and 2014. As a frequent business traveler to Europe, he had the familiarity needed for the task. His philosophy, "If you want to ski a specific area, lead a trip to that area." Al and his co-leader Anne McKinsey were a well-functioning team. *See the 50th anniversary publication on our website for details of these trips*. Al also co-led a ski trip to Switzerland with Liz Wagner in the 1990s and has served on the North Star board as liaison to the Midwest Ski Council.

During the summer Al continues to lead cycling trips throughout the state, always setting a tall example (yes, he's the tallest guy in the club).

A 15-year veteran volunteer for the Ski for Light program, Al is justifiably proud of the work of this organization, which trains and pairs visually impaired skiers with volunteer guides. The teams spend a week skiing at various venues throughout the United States.

## Thirty-one years at Maplelag by Barb Wahman (with Jay Richards and Cindy Darby)

My very first Maplelag trip was led by Jinny McWethy (Mother North Star) and Bryant Dunshee. I later led many trips there, this year being my 31<sup>st</sup>. The first trips were by bus, as were many NSSTC trips back then. On this particular trip there were 45 people on the bus, with pickups in both Minneapolis and St. Paul. Bus trips were always fun with junk food being passed up and down the aisles. We would sing, and sometimes a trip participant would bring a guitar. On the way home, we were usually too worn out from all of the skiing to sing and play.

In the early days, Maplelag was more primitive than it is now, with only one cabin having a bathroom. Most of us had to go to the main lodge for bathroom facilities. Before they built the large 30-person hot tub in the main lodge, the hot tubs were large wooden barrels—outdoors. The main lodge burned to the ground along with a couple of nearby cabins in 1999. The lodge was rebuilt to more than twice the size of the original one.

Maplelag has always had snow, and they do a spectacular job of grooming. One year, there was no snow anywhere in the state, even on the North Shore. I was getting very nervous when we were 50 miles away and the landscape was still brown. But there was skiable snow as the owners had promised. Another year, the wind chill was -90 degrees. The bus did not heat up because it was simply too cold for the bus heater to warm up the bus. We ended up digging into our suitcases to put on all of the extra warm clothes that we had with us.

Maplelag also had many pleasant, lovable dogs over the years. One dog would actually run up and down the hills with the skiers and stay out as long as the skiers were out. If you dropped a glove, the dog would take off with the glove until you could catch him and retrieve the glove. Cindy Darby remembers the dog Laddie nipping at her ankles as she was ice skating.

We had many fun skits over the years. The most laughable ones were with the kids and the dogs. In one skit, the players grabbed an unsuspecting new member to participate with a group of North Star women who were going to the North Pole in the skit. When the John Suisse band performed a song as chickens, they laughed all the way through the skit. We had a North Star band that played for many years with an odd assortment of musical instruments, including wine bottles. It didn't matter whether you could play the instrument or not. We got so bad that you couldn't tell what song we were playing. North Star members were greatly relieved when we finally disbanded, but it was fun when we did it. I even talked Bonnie Palmquist into being band majorette one year using ski poles as batons.

We had some snorers on the trips in the past with many complaints. We solved the problem by putting them all in the same unit.

Cindy Darby always enjoyed the nice people she met on the trip. She admires Ed Waldera and his group who go out to ski before breakfast. Ed and his family have been going to Maplelag almost as long as I have. Leading the trip has been a tremendous experience for me because of the tremendous group of North Stars who have gone on the trips all these years. We are especially grateful to the Richards for their warmth and hospitality.

# Becky and Mark Lystig: skiers, birders, volunteers extraordinaire by Alberta Adams

Becky (Rockwell) Lystig joined the NSSTC in 1970, and she has shared her enthusiasm and friendship with dozens of skiers for almost 50 years.

Becky saw an article about the club in the Minneapolis Star and Tribune in 1970 and went to the meeting at Theodore Wirth Chalet where the room was so packed that she sat in a windowsill to see the demonstration on ski preparation using pine tar. She was so taken that she immediately joined. Her early memories include meeting two welcoming exemplars, Jinny McWethy and Bob Larson, and skiing at the Jonathan Farmstead. There she had her first ever taste of Scandinavian Fruktsoppa (fruit soup).

Becky's first pair of skis were Madshus without hard edges. They lasted about a year. Then she saw a pair of metal-edged Fishers at REI in Seattle that she "had to have" and somehow got them home. Becky skied miles of backcountry farmland and woods before ski trails became predominant, learning to cross fences with her skis on. She loved the feeling of gliding and the speed in skiing. She expressed that joy flying down hills with the wellknown "Becky's hill scream."

Many North Star trips in her 48 years with the club stand out, such as skiing Bruce Nelson's Banff trip at which the group climbed and climbed and climbed, shedding clothes as they went up. At the chilly top, they redressed and took off downward, controlling speed with carved turns. Becky felt like she was a flying Jean-Claude Killy. On a club trip to Austria, she and her friends tore down the Olympic luge run on a sled. It was EXHILARATING!

Supporting the club she loves, Becky volunteered two years as publicity chair, developing the club's trifold display for the Midwest Mountaineering Expo. She has been the new member coordinator since 1996. Becky and her husband Mark led the hawk migration weekend in Duluth for 10+ years. She and another member have led a North Star birding outing annually at the Old Cedar Bridge area, sharing her expertise on this silent sport too.

In 1984 Becky and Mark Lystig met on a Single Sierran Cascade River State Park ski trip. Becky was smitten and gave Mark, an attorney and a Norwegian-American, a North Star membership. They married in 1986.

Mark has volunteered on the nominating committee and is currently an ad hoc member of the club's board, sharing his financial expertise picked up as treasurer for the Minnesota Ornithology Union (MOU). When one of them is not volunteering at the Raptor Center, MOU, The Society for the Blind and Dyslexic, the Minnesota River Valley Audubon Society, the food shelf, the vegetable seed trials as a Master Gardener, or gardening their own beautiful yard, they love to ski at Stokely Creek and Soumi Hills, and locally at Murphy Hanrehan Park Reserve and Lebanon Hills Regional Park.

What has the club provided for 48 years? Lots of incredible ski experiences and friendships with people who hold common values such as environmental stewardship, and beyond skiing, common interests in birding, folk dancing, and music. Becky and Mark deeply appreciated the love and support of their North Star friends during Becky's hospitalization and rehabilitation after an aneurism. They hope that the North Star club continues to be a strong organization that offers friendships and (except for hill screams) silent sports opportunities to members into the future.
